BATTERIES & LIGHTING (see also Household Hazardous Waste)

Batteries: All rechargeable batteries must be recycled; you can bring them back to most stores that sell them. Many jewelers accept button cells. Cover contacts of rechargeable batteries with tape before recycling. Lead-acid car batteries must be accepted by the retailers that sell them.

Fluorescent Bulbs: Businesses must recycle fluorescent bulbs. Compact fluorescent light bulbs, which should be bagged, are called CFLs below.

All rigid (non-film) plastic, except Styrofoam, is now collected by the NYC Department of Sanitation. This includes CDs and DVDs and their cases: Cases can be recycled with metal, glass, and plastic; Disks should be discarded as garbage.
